

Survives Boat Wreck; Missing While Fishing

Che Bui Farm, 58-year-old former real estate operator, survived the wrecking of the 65-foot sampan Kalawao by a whirlwind on a Molokai reef last Sunday, only to disappear from one of the reefs of the Hermit Isle last Tuesday while fishing for opih.

Accompanied by Alex Winchester, Mr. Farm was enjoying a vacation trip to Molokai. After the ill-fated arrival on the reef the party went fishing last Monday and again on Tuesday.

The missing man was last seen along the reef some distance from the rest of the party, when it was decided it was time to return. One of the party signaled Mr. Farm from a cliff, who answered by a motion he would rejoin them. The party waited for some time but Farm did not put in appearance. His friends thought he was playing a practical joke on them and were not immediately concerned.

A later check, however, proved him to be missing and it is feared that an accident befell him or that he was drowned. Coast Guard parties aided in the search but to no avail.

Members of the family are planning on travelling to Molokai this week. Mr. Farm resided at Kalauao, Oahu.

He was born in Honolulu, Dec. 4th, 1887 and was educated at Old Punahou School, Oahu College.

He was employed as a bookkeeper for various local concerns and later entered private business and was in the real estate rental business for many years. He is survived by the widow, Mrs. Rose K. Farm and one daughter, Rose K. Farm, a student at Sacred Heart Academy and six sons, Clarence, James, Theodore, William, George and Joseph; two brothers, E. O. Farm and Peter Farm of Honolulu, and three sisters, Miss Tattie Farm of Honolulu, Miss Kin Han Farm and Mrs. Uh Lan Clark on the mainland. He also leaves a number of nieces and nephews.
