

## Che Bui Farm, Honolulan, Swept Off Molokai Rocks, Lost In Waves

Swept from a Molokai reef by a high wave last Tuesday, Che Bui Farm, well known Honolulan, was lost in the waters off Kalaupapa, The Star-Bulletin learned Friday.

Mr. Farm, who was in the real estate and rental business here, went to Molokai last Friday with a group of persons to visit the leper settlement at Molokai. They were aboard the 65 foot sampan Kalawao, operated by the territorial board of hospitals and settlements.

The sampan was caught in the Kona storm that raged over the islands Friday night, ran aground on a reef near Kalaupapa and badly damaged. Her cargo also was a loss.

Mr. Farm and all others aboard the Kalawao survived, and landed at Molokai, where he visited for several days. On Tuesday he went fishing on the rocks along the Kalaupapa shore. There he was caught by a giant wave and swept off the reef into the turbulent waters. He was swept to sea and his body has not been recovered, The Star-Bulletin is informed.

Che Bui Farm lived at Kalauao, Aiea, Oahu. He was born in Honolulu, December 4, 1887, and educated at Oahu College (Punahou), graduating in 1909. He was employed as a bookkeeper by various local firms. He later entered private business, real estate and rentals, and was in this business to time of his death.

He leaves a widow, Mrs. Rose K. Farm and one daughter, Rose K. Farm, student at the Sacred Hearts Academy; six sons, Clarence, James, and Theodore, who work at Pearl Harbor navy yard; William and George, students in St. Louis college, and Joseph, with the armed forces.
